Why study in the UK?

Studying abroad is an excellent way to develop your confidence, make friends for life, experience diverse cultures and discover more about yourself. The UK is the perfect place to do this whilst benefiting from a world-renowned quality education.

The UK has been a leader in academia for centuries and a degree from the UK is prestigious and globally recognised, giving you an impressive competitive edge. You can also choose from one of the most diverse subject offerings in the world, so you can study a subject you are passionate about.

Studying in the UK can also be financially beneficial, with degrees taking less time to complete than in many other countries, competitive tuition fees, and the opportunity to work part-time whilst you study.

With the Graduate Route visa, international students who have completed a degree can apply to stay and work in the UK for up to two years after their studies – a brilliant opportunity to benefit from the UK's diverse job market, kickstarting your career.

The UK higher education system

Undergraduate degrees

Undergraduate courses in the UK normally take 3 years to complete. Some programmes also offer an optional additional year to undertake a work placement or study abroad, usually between the second and third year.

UK undergraduate course types include:

- BA (Bachelor of Arts)
- BSc (Bachelor of Science)
- BEd (Bachelor of Education)
- BEng (Bachelor of Engineering)
- BMus (Bachelor of Music)
- LLB (Bachelor of Laws)
- MBBS/MBChB (Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery)

Postgraduate degrees

Postgraduate taught degrees are usually Masters degrees, but there are also Diplomas and Certificates. These degrees are taken after students have completed their undergraduate degree. Postgraduate taught degrees normally take one year to complete. You can search for postgraduate taught courses using the FindAMasters website:

www.findamasters.com

There are a range of research degrees, including PhDs, Masters by Research, and Doctorates. These vary in length and are typically studied after students have completed a postgraduate taught degree.



How to apply

Applications to UK universities are made online through UCAS (Universities and Colleges Admissions Service). This platform allows you to apply for up to five courses (at the same or different universities) in one application, saving time.

Check the entry requirements

- Academic entry requirements: Visit your university's website to check you meet your country's and your course entry requirements
- English language requirements: International students are usually required to take a recognised English Language Test or provide other proof of English proficiency – for more information visit your university's website

2 Apply on the UCAS website

Register for the UCAS Hub (www.ucas.com) and complete the registration questions. You can then start your application.

There are six sections to an application:

- Personal details
- Choices: Apply for up to five courses choices are not ranked, and universities cannot see other applications
- Education: A list of all your current and pending qualifications
- Employment: Details of any full- or part-time paid employment
- Personal statement: A very important part of your application where you can show your motivation for applying (4000-character limit)
- Reference: Provide contact details for a referee (e.g. teacher or adviser) your referee will receive an email from UCAS to submit your reference online

Application closing dates

- 29 January 2025: Equal consideration closing date (or 15 October 2024 for Medicine) all applications submitted by this date are considered equally by universities. You can still apply after this date until 30 June, however universities can close a course if it is fully subscribed. You are advised to apply as early as possible.
- 30 June 2025: Applications are accepted until this date if spaces are available

3 Accept your offer

Each university will review your application, you can track your offers in your UCAS account. You then need to accept or reject your offers in your UCAS account.

There are two types of offers:

- Conditional offer: You must meet certain conditions (for example, you are awaiting exam results)
- Unconditional offer: You have met all the entry requirements

There are two types of acceptances:

- Firm choice: This is your first choice
- Insurance choice: If your firm acceptance is a conditional offer, you can choose an insurance choice as a back-up in case you don't meet the requirements of your firm choice

Pay your tuition fee deposit

Some universities require a tuition fee deposit to secure your place, before your Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) can be issued (see the next step). The deposit payment is deducted from the total cost of your tuition fees.

Receive your Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS)

Once you have accepted an unconditional offer and paid your tuition fee deposit, your university will provide you with a Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS), which you will need for your visa application.

A CAS is an electronic document that confirms to UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) that you have been accepted to study at a valid UK university. It contains your CAS number and details about you and your course.

You can only obtain a CAS once you have an unconditional offer.

6 Apply for a Student visa

Applications are made on the UK Government website: www.gov.uk/student-visa

7 Apply for accommodation

Your university will send you details of their accommodation options, which you can usually apply for once you have received an offer to study. You can also research private accommodation options online.

The University of Hull has a range of modern, on-campus accommodation options. All our rooms are single-person with shared kitchens and social spaces.

8 Arrange travel

Once you have received your Student visa, you can make arrangements to travel to the UK. You can travel to the UK from the start date shown on your visa, which is up to 28 days before your course begins.

Pay tuition fees

Most universities provide the option to pay your tuition fees in instalments. The first instalment is usually due when you enrol.



Top application tips

- Speak with your referee in advance about your UCAS application. Discuss your goals, chosen courses, and relevant achievements to help them tailor their reference and effectively support your application.
- © Check the UCAS website for tips on writing your personal statement. Your personal statement is a chance to get noticed for your unique talents and experiences. It's an important part of the application process as it's an opportunity to talk about yourself and your passions, outside of your grades.
- Some schools, advisers, or agents are registered as UCAS centres, and can support you with your application. Speak with your school counsellor or visit your university's website to find details of approved agents in your country.

Student visas

Most international students need a Student visa to study in the UK. You can check if you need a visa on the UK Government's website: www.gov.uk/check-uk-visa

You should also check with your country's governmental information to confirm if you need a Student visa.

There is a fee to apply for the Student visa. You will also have to pay a healthcare surcharge as part of your application, which allows you to access healthcare in the UK.

When to apply

You will need to apply for your Student visa within 6 months of receiving your Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) from your university, and no earlier than 6 months before the start of your course.

You can apply on the UK Government website: www.gov.uk/student-visa

What you need to apply

You will need your CAS and your passport. You may also need to provide other documentation – visit the UK Government website for details: www.gov.uk/student-visa

After you have applied

If your application is successful, you will receive an eVisa (an online record of your immigration status) from the UK Government. Your eVisa will state the earliest date you can travel to the UK, this is up to 28 days before the start of your course.

Healthcare in the UK

The UK's NHS (National Health Service) is one of the best healthcare systems in the world, offering both physical and mental healthcare services.

International students are eligible to use NHS services. Students are required to pay an Immigration Health Surcharge as part of the Student visa application which entitles students to access the NHS in the UK at no additional cost. This includes at the Doctor's surgery (known as General Practitioner or GP), A&E (accident and emergency), urgent treatment centres, or in a hospital.

You may need to pay for dental and optical treatment as well as medicine prescribed by the doctor and collected from a pharmacy.


Studying in the UK can be good value for money and the average costs are lower than in the USA and Australia.

Working in the UK on a Student visa

Working in the UK can be a rewarding experience, and many international students at the University of Hull choose to take on part-time jobs, work placements, volunteering, or internships alongside their studies.

International students can work up to 20 hours per week during term time, depending on their course – you can check what hours you can work on your eVisa.

During the University's published holiday periods (Christmas and Easter), the restriction on the hours you can work does not apply, and you can work up to full-time hours during this period.

You can also work full-time after your programme end date (as confirmed on your student record) until your Student visa expires, provided you have no further requirements for your studies at the University.



Staying in the UK after graduation

After you have completed your degree, you can switch to a Graduate visa to stay in the UK for at least 2 years after successfully completing your course.
