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Code of Student Conduct

1 Introduction

- 1.1 This code sets out the standards and behaviours all students are expected to exhibit whilst studying at the University of Hull, to support the University in its commitment to advancing knowledge and education for the benefit of individuals and the wider society.
- 1.2 In accepting an offer to study at the University of Hull, students agree to be bound by the University's terms and conditions, including all regulations, policies, codes (including this code) and rules.

2 Scope

- 2.1 The Code of Student Conduct applies to all students registered at the University of Hull. This includes students whose studies are suspended, and students who have completed their studies but are yet to graduate from the University.
- 2.2 This Code applies in relation to students' conduct on or off campus and on-line conduct. The code applies where a student is engaged with activities, services or facilities as a student of the University or where conduct may adversely affect another member of the University Community, the University's interests or bring the University into disrepute and/or where conduct may pose a safeguarding concern to any other member of the University Community.

3 Purpose

- 3.1 The purpose of the Code is to establish expectations for Student behaviour and to foster a respectful, inclusive, and safe learning environment for everyone.
- 3.2 The code defines acceptable behaviour by clarifying what is considered acceptable conduct and details the potential penalties, as imposed via the Student Disciplinary Regulations, for violating the code.

4 Students' Responsibilities

- 4.1 In accepting an offer to study at the University of Hull, students become an ambassador of the University and are expected to behave in a manner which reflects the University's values and culture, as set out within the Student Charter. The following list is indicative (but not exhaustive) of the type of behaviours expected from University of Hull students:
 - a. Respecting and celebrating diversity;
 - b. Acting with honesty and integrity;
 - c. Respecting all others, and being considerate and courteous;
 - d. Being punctual for classes, seminars and any other scheduled sessions or appointments within the University;
 - e. Notifying a member of staff or other relevant person if you are unable to attend an appointment;
 - f. Respecting the campus and general environment;
 - g. Respect for University and personal property;
 - h. Recycling and disposing of litter properly;



- i. Demonstrating a respect for health and safety;
- j. Engaging positively with the local community; and
- k. Acting in accordance with all the University's regulations, policies, procedures, codes of practice and guidance.
- 4.2 Members of the University are responsible for the conduct of their guests whilst on university premises. No person who has been excluded from the University may be invited onto university premises as a guest.
- 4.3 Any student who knowingly helps, promotes or encourages any form of Misconduct by another individual may be deemed complicit in that behaviour and as such, in breach of this code.
- 4.4 Students and Staff are encouraged to report any breach of this Code to the University. The University will actively respond to and take seriously all reported breaches of the Code acting as deemed proportionate in accordance with the relevant University policy/procedure.
- 4.5 The list below is indicative (but not exhaustive) of the type of behaviour that would constitute Category A and Category B misconduct, and the likely sanctions associated with such behaviours. This is illustrative only and a full list of the sanctions which could be imposed by the University are set out in the University's Student Disciplinary Regulations. One or more sanctions may be issued for any given offence.
- 4.6 Behaviour does not have to be directed against a particular individual(s) for it to amount to harassment.
- 4.7 The Conduct and Complaints Team has the discretion to re-categorise an offence which might usually be deemed Category B to a Category A and vice versa dependent on any aggravating and/or mitigating factors which might apply.
- 4.8 The Code of Student Conduct aligns with the Higher Education Freedom of Speech Act 2023 and regulatory advice issued by the Office for Students. Nothing in this application of the code should restrict lawful free speech.
- 4.9 The Code of Student Conduct aligns with the University's Sexual Misconduct Violence & Harassment Policy and Disclosure Procedure; the single comprehensive source of information which sets out policies and procedures on subject matters relating to incidents of harassment and sexual misconduct as per the Office for Students Condition E6: Harassment and sexual misconduct.
- 4.10 Multiple or repeated incidents of misconduct may be more serious than a single act of misconduct and previous findings may be considered when determining what sanction should be imposed
- 4.11 The Student Disciplinary Regulations contain the processes for dealing with cases of Category A and Category B misconduct, and penalty definitions.

- provide a risk to other students, staff or other users of the University's services
- Bribery or attempted bribery
- Conduct which obstructs or attempts to obstruct the free movement and/or freedom of speech of staff (taking account of the University's Freedom of Speech Policy), students or visitors from any University building or premises
- Communication of information confidential to the University or to its members to anyone outside the University.
- Communication/Sharing of information relating to a Formal Investigation under these Regulations when directed not to do so and/or without seeking authority.

Category B:

- Improper interference with the activities of the University (including academic, administrative, sporting and social) on University premises or elsewhere
- Improper interference with the functions, duties or activities of any student or employee of the University or any authorised visitor to the University
- Misuse of student ID card including to falsify attendance records for yourself or other students
- Failure to produce appropriate identification within a reasonable period of time on reasonable request from any member of staff, including placement providers' staff
- Failure to comply with any reasonable request or instructions from any member of staff including failing to engage in Informal Resolution
