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| 1 | <p>Policy/CoP title</p> <p>Open Access Policy 2026</p> |
| 2 | <p>Summary description</p> <p>The University of Hull recognises open access publication as a valuable component of dissemination for research outputs and that openness to research outputs is inherently of value. Open access publication channels for journal articles in particular are mainstream: equivalent routes are also continuing to develop for monographs, research data and software. Open access dissemination of research outputs broadens the audience that can be reached and enables wider engagement with the research and its findings. This can generate increased potential for impact and collaboration, with concomitant reputational benefits for future research.</p> <p>Research funders are increasingly advocating and often mandating open access as a means of publication to realise these advantages. This policy describes an approach to open access for the University of Hull that blends the advantages of open access with the requirements laid out by funders in following this path.</p> |
| 3 | <p>Scope</p> <p>The Policy affects all those engaged in research and producing outputs from that research.</p> |
| 4 | <p>With effect from</p> <p>1st April 2015 (previously reviewed May 2023)</p> |
| 5 | <p>Other related policies/CoPs</p> <p>There are no directly linked policies, although REF policy/code of practice depends closely on the effective delivery of open access through implementation of this policy. The Institutional Rights Retention Policy (2025) acts as a mechanism to enable open access and supplements this Policy in tandem with the IP Policy (2025). Open access is also closely linked to research data management and there is thus a connection with the Research Data Management and Sharing Policy (2023) and related institutional developments in this area. Open access is also incorporated into the Code of Good Research Practice (2023) and that Code is aligned with this policy.</p> |

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University of Hull Open Access Policy

Open access literature is digital, online, free of charge, and free of most copyright and licensing restrictions¹. This policy covers how the University of Hull will manage open access for the dissemination of research outputs: this affects all those engaged in research development and delivery, production, dissemination, marketing, and evaluation.

The University of Hull recognises open access publication as a valuable component of dissemination for research outputs and that openness to research outputs is inherently of value. Open access publication channels for journal articles in particular are mainstream: equivalent routes are also continuing to develop for monographs, research data and software. Open access dissemination of research outputs broadens the audience that can be reached and enables wider engagement with the research and its findings. This can generate increased potential for impact and collaboration, with concomitant reputational benefits for future research.

Guidance on open access and its use is available through the Library's LibGuide at <https://libguides.hull.ac.uk/openaccess>.

Research funders are advocating, and often mandating, open access as a means of publication to realise these advantages. This policy describes an approach to open access publishing for the University of Hull that supports authors' choice of publication channel whilst ensuring that research funders' criteria for openness are met. Its use is in part fulfilment of the University of Hull Research Strategy (<https://www.hull.ac.uk/asset-library/docs/Research-and-KE-Strategy-2025-to-2030.pdf>).

Failure to comply with this policy may mean that research outputs would not be eligible for submission to future REF exercises, and may risk penalties from external funders.

This policy is laid out in three sections: the responsibilities of researchers; the University's commitments; and management of this policy.

Deposit of research outputs: researchers' responsibilities

Collecting the research outputs of the University, or a record of them, supports discovery of and engagement with publications produced by staff and students of the University and enables the University to curate a record of institutional research activity to provide open access in compliance with funder and publisher terms. Such a collection also supports University reporting requirements to external agencies and the preservation of the outputs for the research record.

1. All research outputs must be recorded within the nominated University CRIS system [Note 1]. An appropriate version [Note 2] of the full content of text-based outputs must also be deposited in this system; deposit of other forms of output is encouraged where technological constraints permit. Such recording and deposit is the responsibility of the author.
2. Non-text-based outputs should be deposited in the most suitable venue for their long-term management [Note 3]. This includes the data used and/or produced that underpins the research publication, in accordance with the University's Research Data Management and Sharing Policy.

3. Where outputs are related to funded projects, a link between the output(s) and project(s) should be made within the CRIS as part of the deposit process.
4. Use of the University CRIS system does not preclude dissemination of the research outputs through other channels. The channels selected for dissemination of research outputs are a matter of academic freedom. Decisions should be informed by funder, discipline, audience, purpose, and timeliness, in keeping with research dissemination strategies and plans.
5. The deposit of publications to the CRIS must be in line with external funder or policy drivers.
6. Researchers are responsible for being aware of any funder or sector policies relating to open access to research outputs, and acting on these accordingly [Note 4]. Funder-specific requirements should be communicated as part of depositing the output.
7. It is the researcher's responsibility to give due consideration to issues of privacy, security, and intellectual property within the research output before publishing or making the output available with open access.
8. To aid open access dissemination researchers are encouraged to retain their intellectual property rights in research outputs, where this does not conflict with contractual obligations [Note 5]. Journal articles deposited will be managed in this regard in accordance with the Institutional Rights Retention Policy (2025) to facilitate open access through appropriate licensing.

Dissemination of outputs via open access: University responsibilities

Once deposited in the CRIS, records of research outputs will be made public in the University Repository, with an open licence for the work where funder/publisher terms permit, in accordance with the terms of this policy. Journal articles, specifically, will be managed as stated in paragraph 8.

9. The University will provide the relevant systems and guidance to facilitate deposit, and promote engagement with this process through appropriate training.
10. Once deposited, the University will take responsibility for the records and digital outputs, and curate them for long-term access and preservation as required.
11. Research outputs with access restrictions will be managed securely to limit access as required.
12. Where compliance with funder or sector criteria for open access cannot be achieved, the exceptional circumstances will be explored with the author and recorded with the output. Such exceptions must be agreed and signed off by an Associate Dean for Research.
13. All research outputs made available on open access will clearly state the licence terms selected/agreed to by the author to state how the output can be used, in accordance with guidance within the University of Hull IP Policy and Institutional Rights Retention Policy [Note 6].

Management of this policy

Management of the policy will be undertaken as follows:

14. University Research and Knowledge Exchange Committee (URKEC) will be responsible for reviewing and updating this policy, delegating this task to the Open Access Working Group (OAWG).

15. The scholarly publishing environment continues to evolve. This policy will thus be reviewed on a periodic basis to accommodate developments and experience gained in the implementation of the policy.
 16. It is the responsibility of all researchers to ensure they are compliant with the terms of this policy.
 17. Implementation of the policy will be overseen by URKEC, acting through the OAWG and other channels as appropriate.
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Annex A: Notes

These notes provide current context for the open access policy, and highlight issues that need to be taken into account in implementing such a policy.

Note 1 – The University’s Current Research Information System (CRIS) for recording all research outputs is Worktribe².

Note 2 – The appropriate version of the text depends on the terms of the author’s agreement to publish, and any conditions applying to funding acknowledged in the work: commonly the author’s accepted manuscript or the published version of record. Text outputs include, but are not limited to, journal articles, books, book chapters, conference contribution, report, working papers, or thesis.

Note 3 – This policy primarily deals with digital research outputs. Records of non-digital research outputs must also be recorded using a brief metadata record: management of the output itself is the responsibility of the researcher, and its availability status recorded as part of the metadata record.

Note 4 – The two main policies that researchers should be aware of are the REF open access policy³ and funder policies aligned with Plan S⁴, including UKRI⁵, EU and Wellcome Trust. [Other funders](#) may also have specific requirements, and researchers should check these to ensure compliance.

Note 5 – For example, note that copyright assignment to publishers is not required for publication in many cases⁶.

Note 6 – The funder often sets this out. For example, UKRI require that the Creative Commons Attribution (CC-BY) licence is used for Gold open access and a Creative Commons Attribution-Non-commercial (CC-BY-NC) licence used for Green open access.
