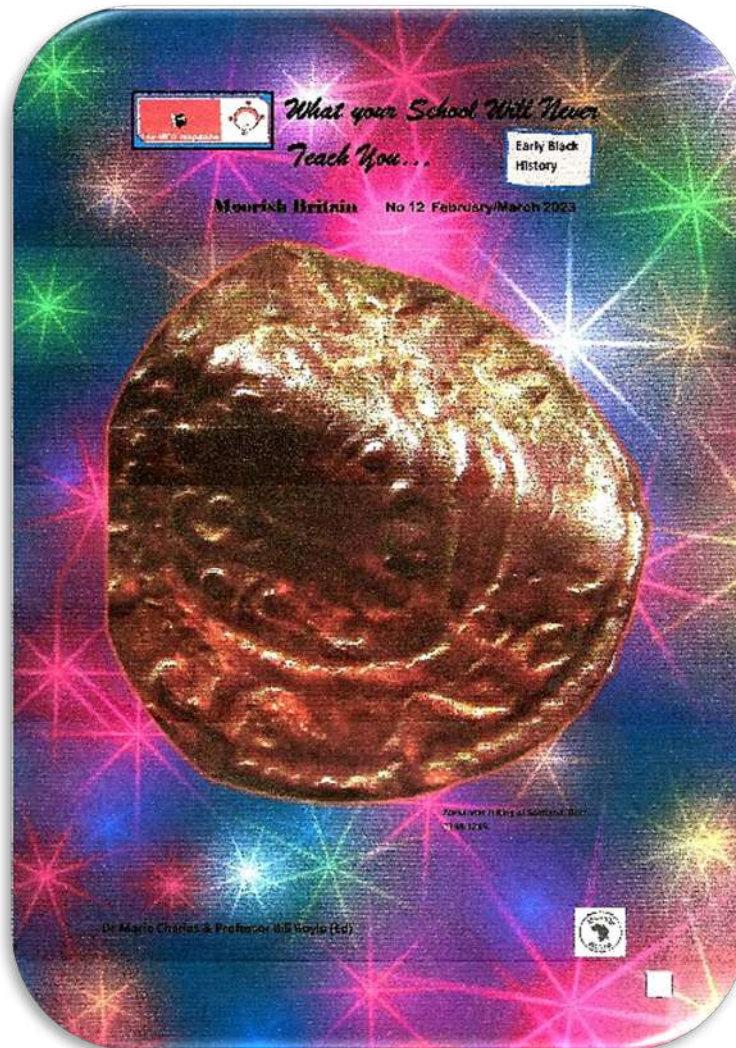



**Dr Marie Charles is the Director of MFIT and the founder/author of the journal publication: *The Missing Faces In Teaching*.**

**Newburgh** of Fife and Aberdeen. The title was created by Charles II in 1660. See the Stewarts in issue # 12.

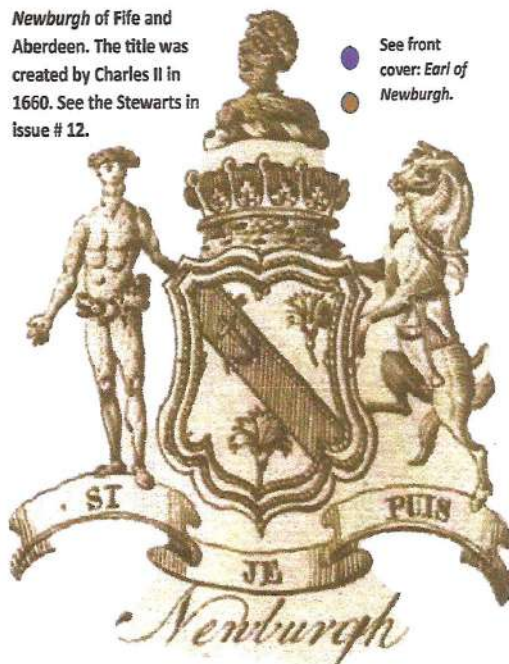


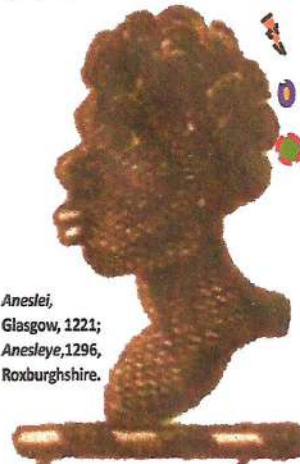

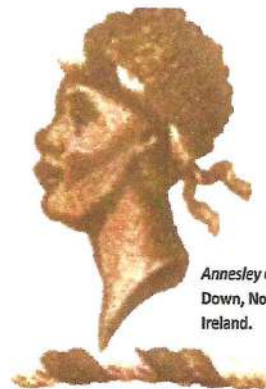
